The State Government has announced a new approach to preventing youth crime across Victoria, launching a Violence Reduction Unit (VRU) modelled on the successful programs in Glasgow and London. The VRU will focus on stopping crime before it starts by addressing its root causes.

The Unit will coordinate existing crime prevention programs, identify gaps and develop new initiatives. Its first major project will pair at-risk children with mentors from 16 Yards – former offenders who have turned their lives around and now support young people to do the same.

While Victoria already has several crime prevention programs, they are not always data-driven or well-connected, which leaves room for improvement. We also need innovative approaches that respond to the evolving ways young people are being drawn into violent crime. Importantly, these solutions must involve the whole community – not just government.

There are no simple answers to youth crime, but early intervention remains the most effective way to prevent youth crime, and this new strategy reflects that commitment.

As we head into summer, when our roads and waterways become busier and our region welcomes many visitors, it's a timely reminder that community safety takes many forms. Slowing down, driving to the conditions and planning ahead all help ensure everyone gets home safely.


It's also important to be prepared for fire. The Fire Danger Period is when the CFA restricts the use of fire in the community. This is to help prevent fires from starting. The 2026 Fire Danger Period commences on 1.00am Monday 24 November 2025 for the City of Greater Geelong and Borough of Queenscliffe municipalities.

It is important to note that the Fire Danger Period is not the same as Total Fire Bans, which are declared by the CFA on days when fires are likely to spread rapidly and be difficult to control.

You can keep informed on Total Fire Bans, as well as emergency information and warnings through the Vic Emergency App or website – <u>emergency.vic.gov.au</u>

BEWARE THE GRINCHES

With the Christmas shopping frenzy ramping up, it is a busy time for many of us.

Remember to check that your car is locked and all valuables have been removed before you head off to the shops.

5 ways to ensure your online shopping reaches you

With the Black Friday sales coming up late November, consider the best way to make sure your purchases arrive safely.

Will your parcel be safe on your doorstep all day while you are at work? Have them sent somewhere secure if you're not going to be home.

Online shopping is great – just a couple of clicks and in a few days your purchases are at your door – most of the time. However, as we move more of our regular shopping to be online, the chances of your parcels being stolen from your doorstep is increasing.

Here are 5 handy tips to increase the chances of your online shopping reaching you safely.

1. Choose click and collect.

If the online shop offers it and you live relatively close to the store location, choose "click and collect" rather than delivery by mail or courier.

2. Make sure your safe place is actually safe.

Many online stores now give you the opportunity at checkout to specify a preferred location to leave your deliveries if you're not home. Your safe place could be behind the shed, under the tank, or with a neighbour. If you have a MyPost account with Australia Post, you can also indicate where you would like parcels left or ask them to take parcels to the nearest post office if you're not home. However, be cautious of doing this – there aren't many hiding places that a thief hasn't thought of.

3. Get parcels sent to a secure locker.

Some companies, such as Australia Post, Sendle and Amazon have secure lockers located throughout Victoria where parcels can be sent. You enter your chosen parcel locker as your delivery address at the online checkout.


4. Install a parcel letterbox.

If you receive a lot of parcels, consider installing a parcel letterbox, which is designed to safely house parcels as well as letters. They usually have a large flap for parcels and a narrow slot for letters. The doors to each compartment are lockable, with either a key or a pin code – some even have smart locks.

If you're buying something of value, choose to have the parcel tracked and need a signature on delivery. If the seller doesn't offer these options, consider buying the item elsewhere.

5. Have parcels sent somewhere else.

Consider having your parcels sent to your work address if that's allowed. Or perhaps you have a kind neighbour, friend or family member who's retired or works from home and wouldn't mind receiving parcels for you.

How do you get help in an emergency



Call 000

There are language interpreters available

Call '000' when there is a danger to life, health or property:



Active



Serious illness /

injury

violence

Family





Fire / Hazards

Call 000 when you need help from:



Police

for serious crimes that are happening now



Ambulance

for serious injury or illness that needs urgent medical help



Fire

for incidents with fire, hazards or where rescue is required



Call 132 500

for storm, flood, tsunami or earthquake emergency in Victoria (non life-threatening)



Call 131 444

for non-urgent crimes and events requiring police or for general police enquiries



When you call 000 you will be asked:



Which service you need (police, fire or ambulance)



The exact location or address of the emergency

You can request a language interpreter if you need to



Other questions you may be asked:

What has happened? How many people are injured? Is there any violence or weapons? Is there any smoke or fire? Is anyone trapped? Is the patient awake? Is the patient breathing?

> The call-taker will guide you through the process and organise the right help. Remember to:



Stay on the line



Remain calm





Choose to remain anonymous if
